Lighting the Collection

The Albright-Knox Art Gallery enjoys a worldwide reputation as an outstanding center of modern art. The permanent collection includes brilliant examples of Abstract Expressionism, Pop art, and art of the seventies and eighties, housed in the original 1906 building as well as the 1962 addition.

Recent renovations in the 1906 building included removal of surface-mount lighting track, and installation of recess-mount BusRun™ busway in restored plaster ceilings. The result is elegant and low-profile, while capable of handling large loads per feed. Fixtures with PAR-56 lamps provide the long throw necessary for eighteen-foot ceilings, and can hold multiple accessories, such as UV filters, spread lenses and baffles.

Recessed BusRun™ busway can be installed in either a drywall or plaster, (as shown above).

Litelab Lights Monet Masterpieces

Expanded twice in its ninety-three year history, the Albright-Knox Art Gallery recently presented a special exhibition of Monet masterpieces in the 1962 wing.

“Monet at Giverny” featured twenty-two paintings that Claude Monet painted between 1903 and 1926 while living at Giverny, not far from Paris.

The 1962 wing, with ten-foot ceiling height and modular layout capabilities, allowed the masterpieces to be viewed in an intimate, human-scale setting.

Renovations completed the year prior to the exhibition, replaced an older, less flexible lighting system with BusRun™ busway and accent lighting fixtures manufactured by Litelab.

BusRun™ busway was pendant-mounted from above the suspended, modular ceiling.

Model L-140 fixtures, with PAR-38 lamps, accent masterpieces on loan from the Musée Marmottan and afterward, the permanent collection.
